What to Bring-Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills

Reference: *Boy Scout Handbook*, chapter 9, "Camping"

Overnight gear, outdoor essentials and appropriate clothing are the heart of camping equipment. Carry a light load of only what you need to keep yourself safe and make a good camp; leave all unnecessary items at home.

NOTE: This gear is necessary for each patrol. During pre-weekend meeting, patrol assignments will be made and patrol gear will be split up among patrol members.

Two person backpacking tent with poles, stakes, ground cloths, and lines

Dining fly

Nylon cord, 50 feet

Cleanup Kit

Sponge or dishcloth

Biodegradable soap

Sanitizing rinse agent (bleach)

Scouring pads (no-soap type)

Plastic trash bags

Toilet paper in plastic bag

Repair Kit (Thread, needles, safety pins)

Group Extras (Coordinate with other participants)

Hot-pot tongs

Camp shovel

Water container, one 1-gallon or two ½-gallon collapsible, plastic

Washbasin

Grill

Pot rods

Patrol flag

Small U.S. flag

Sheathed ax

Camp saw
